LETTERS AND PAPERS

ADLER, SAMUEL; 2 letters, 1858, 1859, New York, New York, German, Photo-

In these letters addressed to G. Foreman, the rabbi of Temple Emanu-El, New York, discusses the tasks of a rabbi, his relations to his congregation, the Reform Movement, the foundation of new Reform congregations, his own opinion of Einhorn's prayerbook, and the development of Congregation Emanu-El. (Gift of Dr. Philipson.)

ALEXANDER, MOSES, 1853-1932; 2 letters, 1914, 1915, Boise, Idaho, Photostats

The Governor of the State of Idaho (1915-1919) reflects back on his early days when he worked as a businessman in Chillicothe, Missouri, for A. Wollbrunn, to whom the letters are addressed, thanking him for the fine education he received in those years. Proud of honors conferred upon him.

ALLEGRO, AMBROSIO; 2 letters, 1815, Tunis, Africa, Photostats

These letters, written to Mordecai Manuel Noah after he was recalled from his position as consul in Tunis, inform him about the state of affairs in that country and discuss the purchase of Noah's furniture and possessions. He comments on the attitude of the American Government upon Noah's recall, and expresses the hope that the President will render Noah the justice he deserves.

ARIAS, DAVID DIAS, Papers; 32 items, 1759-1760, New Orleans, Louisiana, Mobile, Louisiana, French, Photostats

Correspondence between Kerlérec, the Governor of Louisiana, de Rochemore, the ordonnateur in Louisiana, and other French officials in the colony, and the Government in France concerning the confiscation of a ship "Le Texel" and its goods, and the imprisonment of its Captain, the English Jew, David Dias Arias (also written Dias Azarias) as a spy and enemy of the State, Arias' trial, his testimony and his acquittal. De Rochemore explains and defends in his letters his attitude and his actions in this affair. In a letter (October 13, 1759) to the Minister in Paris he gives an account of the sudden death of Arias duirng the trial, stating that the "Texel" and part of its unsold cargo has been taken over by the attorney for unclaimed property. Some letters discuss also the political, social, and legal situation and the economic activities of the Jews in Louisiana at that time.

The secretary of Har Sinai Verein describes in a letter to Gotthold Salomon in Hamburg the bad spiritual situation of the American Jews and the attempts at a spiritual awakening. He asks Salomon to send some copies of his prayerbook to Baltimore and to help in the reforming of the Har Sinai Congregation. (Gift of Dr. Philipson.)

BILLIKOPF, JACOB, Collection; 17 items, 1918-1950, Chicago, Illinois, Philadelphia, Pennsylvania, Pittsburgh, Pennsylvania, Princeton, New Jersey, Photostats and Typescripts

The letters written and received by Billikopf deal with Jewish philanthropy, settlement activities, Jewish education, religious affairs, and personal matters. They contain also vivid characterizations of Justice Brandeis, Benjamin Nathan Cardozo, Albert Einstein, and Louis Marshall. Mentioned are Sidney Hillman, Judah Magnes, Julius Rosenwald, Jacob H. Schiff, Harland Stone, F. Warburg. (Gift of Dr. Billikopf.)

BIZARD, I.; letter, 1871, Strassbourg, France, French, Manuscript

In the letter addressed to Dr. Adler, New York, Bizard thanks him for his letter of sympathy on the defeat of France and his offer of help for the victims of the War.

Truman and others to the Chairman of the House Committee on Foreign Affairs and the Delegate to the United Nations Conference on international organization, expressing appreciation of Bloom's fine cooperation and valuable aid in all war efforts, his loyal support of foreign policy and leg-

islation, his patriotic, unselfish services, his integrity and self-sacrifice. "An ideal citizen who responded to every call of the poor and under-privileged."

Probably directed to Samuel Adler, the letter describes the sad conditions of the Russian Jews and his (Crémieux's) efforts to improve them. Asks for help. (Gift of Dr. Philipson.)

CRONBACH, ABRAHAM, Correspondence; 31 letters, 1916-1949, Albany, New York, Cincinnati, Ohio, Jerusalem, Israel, London, England, New York, New York, Manuscript

Letters from F. Adler, B. Bamberger, S. Brodetsky, I. Elbogen, H. Grinstein, A. Marx, C. Roth to A. Cronbach, from N. Glueck to S. Blank, from A. Marx to J. Morgenstern, from Roth to Blank, about sociological and ethical questions, biblical and historical problems, and the editing of the Hebrew Union College Annual.

In these letters addressed to Samuel Adler and Bernhard Felsenthal, Einhorn discusses scientific, educational, rabbinical, and congregational problems, and his *Prayer Book*. Criticizes Geiger, Leeser, and Wise bitterly.

A letter of sympathy on the death of Paul Richman's wife. "There is no consolation—we have to take in humility the hardships life is bringing upon us." (Gift of Dr. Marcus.)

EZEKIEL, SIR MOSES, 1844-1917, Papers; 14 letters, 1866-1922, Arlington, Vermont, Cincinnati, Ohio, Lexington, Virginia, New York, New York, Northampton, Massachusetts, Paris, France, Richmond, Virginia, Rome, Italy, Manuscript

Letters from friends (including Oscar S. Straus and G. D'Annunzio) to the sculptor expressing their admiration for his art, and from Ezekiel in Rome to his brother and father describing his work and analyzing his opinion of Israel's mission on earth. Shortly after he returned from soldiering in the Civil War, and took up his studies again at the Virginia Military Institute, he wrote to his cousin and sweetheart Lenora Levy. In this letter (1866) he mourned for the death of Stonewall Jackson and recalled with sadness the names and deeds of the fallen heroes of the South.

Before his death he asks his children who are living in America never to desecrate the Salbath and to maintain their love for the Jewish religion.

FELDMAN, ABRAHAM J., Collection; 4 letters, 1923-1924, New York, New York, Manuscript and Typescript

From Bernard Baruch and Kaufmann Kohler to Feldman. Kohler shows his warm interest in Feldman's career as rabbi and preacher and thanks him for the intention to dedicate his collection of sermons to him in honor of his 80th birthday.

FELSENTHAL, BERNHARD, Correspondence; 15 items, 1864-1901, Chicago, Illinois, Manuscript and Typescript

Addresses, resolutions, and letters from members of the Chicago Zion Congregation to Felsenthal, a contract between Felsenthal and his congregation (1864), and letters from Felsenthal to friends. In correspondence with Abraham Geiger (1874) and David Philipson (1904) he deals with Zunz's 80th birthday and Geiger's magazine, the Science of Judaism, his opposition to the Synod Movement, his opinion on Geistesfreiheit and the gradual and natural development of Judaism.

GEIGER, ABRAHAM; 10 letters, 1863-1874, Frankfurt, Breslau, Germany, German, Manuscript

In these letters written to Samuel Adler and Bernhard Felsenthal, Geiger warmly recommends Kaufmann Kohler. Very important to win him for America. Writes about his own scientific work, his activity as rabbi in Frankfurt, and

as lecturer at the Hochschule in Berlin, the foundation of his magazine Juedische Zeitschrift fuer Wissenschaft und Leben, the political situation in Germany, the Reform Movement in Germany and America, and its mutual influence. Expresses his sympathy for American cultural undertakings and criticizes German, Austrian, and American writers and magazines. Mentioned are: Deutsch, Einhon, Graetz, Greenbaum, Hirsch, Jastrow, Leeser, Lilienthal, Zunz.

GRATZ, REBECCA; 546 letters, 1797-1863, Philadelphia, Pennsylvania, Photostats

The letters are mostly addressed to Miriam Moses Cohen, Maria Fenno Hoffmann, Mary Elizabeth Fenno, Benjamin Gratz, Maria Gist Gratz, Ann Shelby Gratz, and other members of the Gratz family. They deal with personal and family affairs, the social, cultural, political, and literary events in Philadelphia and New York, educational and congregational problems, inter-marriages, conversions, music, writers, books, magazines, the theatre, the establishment of the "Female Hebrew Benevolent Society," her position as honorary secretary, and her activities in the Jewish Sunday School.

A letter of thanks to the Faculty of the Hebrew Union College for the honor of being named "Doctor of Divinity." On his scientific and Jewish development. Judaism source of his philosophy, his spiritual life, his Weltanschauung.

The collection contains also 17 very interesting letters from Myer Levy, a soldier in the Civil War, to his family, mainly to his brother Elias P. on his camp and battle experiences during the years 1860-1864, and the fate of his friends and fellow-soldiers.

A letter of President John Tyler (1844) to the Senate nominating Levy Captain in the Navy. A memorial of Uriah P. Levy to the Senate (1855) complaining of the illegal action, in his case, of the Board of Naval officers whereby he has been stricken from the rolls and asking Congress to restore him to his former position in the Navy. A petition of Jonas P. Levy to the Senate and House of Representatives (1852) proposing to open communications from Vera Cruz and Alvarado on the Gulf

of Mexico to Huatulco in the Pacific, and to convey the mails between New York and New Orleans and San Francisco in twenty days. Including a petition of Jonas P. Levy to the Senate of Mexico to grant a privilege to open communications between the Gulf of Mexico and the Pacific. Memorial of Jonas P. Levy to the Senate and House of Representatives (1856) urging that provisions be made for the appointment of schoolmasters to teach apprentices desirous of entering the Navy. Also for their promotion in that service.


LILIENTHAL, MAX; letter, 1841, St. Petersburg, Russia, German, Manuscript

Lilienthal, who was summoned by the Russian Government to St. Petersburg in order, apparently, to ameliorate the moral, spiritual, and religious conditions of the Jews, describes in a letter to Dr. Loewi of Fuerth, Germany, the poverty and pitiful situation of the Russian Jews, the Emancipation plan of the government, and the need for men to fulfill this task. He asks Loewi to send able German educators to Russia.

A highly interesting correspondence between members of the German-American Mailert Family (also written Meylert), and between them and their friends, especially between Charles Lucius and his brother August Mailert, and between S. Meylert and his nephew August Mailert. Charles Lucius, a Jewish teacher and principal of a private school in Cassel, writes (1833-1849) to his brother, who emigrated to the U. S. A., about the intolerable political, military,

and religious situation in Germany, the revolutionary mood of the people, the autocracy of the princes, the unjust laws, the heavy taxes, the suppression of free speech and thought, the depressing economic and social condition of the German Jews, anti-Semitism, the Emancipation Movement, about his job as teacher, his studies of the English language, his love for America, and his intention to emigrate to the land of freedom. Discussion of American business life, the money crisis, and August's intention to become a farmer. Many letters deal with family affairs, relatives, friends, birth of children, engagements, weddings, and the unhappy marriage of the writer, his sickness and helplessness.

S. Meylert, the uncle of Charles Lucius and August, and father of the famons Michael Meylert, who became one of the founders of Sullivan County, a lumberman, editor, banker, road and empire builder, was himself a farmer, land agent, and real estate dealer in Pennsylvania, and, as it seems, a convert. In 25 letters (1832-1846) he discusses with his nephew August the situation of the German Jews in the U.S.A., the American business, economic, and money system, import and export matters, the affairs of the State of Pennsylvania, the education and character of his children, especially of Michael, whom he believes will "make an excellent mathematician." In many letters he deals with the land speculation business, the development of his own farm, and the situation of the American farmer. His son Amos describes in 11 letters (1840-1847) to his cousin August his various professions as a student of law, businessman, and farmer. In this group of letters he comments in considerable detail on American politics, the affairs of the State of Pennsylvania, presidential elections, Democrats and Whigs, the character of Polk and Clay. He wants to go to Texas as this state will become the best country in the world for a businessman.
